INTERIM EXECUTIVE **DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

Dear Friends.

In 2020, what began as a year with exciting new programming with partners in Ethiopia and South Africa. the introduction of our programming for boys in Uganda, and planned expansion of our work into several countries, very quickly shifted to COVID-19 evacuations and lockdowns that forced us to pause most of our programming. NMNW staff kept working remotely during the initial lockdown period with a focus on incorporating lessons learned from both partner feedback and monitoring and evaluation data to enhance our materials. This also gave us time and space to develop our team culture, look at what diversity means at NMNW, strengthen operational processes and policies, and further build out our scale strategy. Looking back, we are thankful that we had this opportunity to hit pause on programming in order to reflect, build our team, and significantly improve the quality and efficiency of our work.

In response to the continued need for our programming, we developed a COVID safe curriculum, program adaptations, and training models which took into account the need for social distancing, smaller class size, masking, and modified physical skills practice. The response to these adaptations was very positive, and



we were able to continue to train Instructors in multiple countries. including a small team of female Instructors from Ggeberha (formerly Port Elizabeth), South Africa who successfully launched our new Research and Innovation Hub. This meant that despite the challenges of 2020, thousands of youth were able to go through No Means No programming.

As challenging as 2020 was, I am writing to you with a great sense of pride and hope for the coming years. I am awed by the hard work, dedication, commitment to quality, and resilience of our partners. NMNW remains ready to expand our evidence-based sexual violence prevention programs.

Thank you so much for your support, and for being part of a community dedicated to improving the lives of young people and creating a world free from sexual violence!



OUR MISSION

No Means No Worldwide (NMNW) is an international nongovernmental organization whose mission is to end sexual and gender-based violence against women and children globally.



OUR APPROACH

NMNW trains instructors in high-risk environments to deliver the proven No Means No curricula to girls and boys ages 10-20. Through the program, girls increase their skills in assertiveness, boundary setting, and understanding of their rights, and develop the verbal and physical skills to defend themselves from sexual assault. Boys increase their gender equitable attitudes, learn skills to defend equality, avoid violence, ask for consent, and intervene when witnessing or anticipating sexual assault. NMNW also works to increase girls' and boys' disclosure of experiences of sexual violence and provide referrals for comprehensive support.

ADAPTING TO COVID-19



if no changes were made. Simultaneously, the data also showed that the need for our work was critical, with the epidemic of sexual and gender-based violence increasing across the globe alongside the pandemic. So, we created No Means No: COVID Safe, a safer way to train new Instructors and to deliver our curricula during COVID-19. Based on extensive analysis of internal and external data, we determined the ideal approach to adapting our curriculum implement the curriculum more safely.

With significant demand for NMNW to provide virtual training, we piloted this virtual training of Instructors approach with local partners in Nigeria and South Africa in Q4. Results from our rapid process evaluation showed that the trainings were extremely well received by partners and participants.

LAYING THE GROUNDWORK FOR SCALE IN ETHIOPIA & SOUTH AFRICA

NMNW entered into two strategic partnerships in 2020 that we expect will achieve transformational scale in South Africa and Ethiopia over the next several years. In South Africa, NMNW teamed up with NACOSA, a South African NGO that is made up of a network of over 1,500 civil society organizations working together to turn the tide on HIV, AIDS and TB in Southern Africa, NMNW trained 65 female Instructors from 17 local implementing partners who, in spite of COVID-19, were able to graduate 3,356 young people from No Means No in 5 provinces. After implementing No Means No for several months, 11 of the highest performing Instructors were selected and trained in October to become Assistant Trainers and will be certified in 2021 to lead the scale up of No Means No programming in South Africa by training and overseeing hundreds of new Instructors in 7 provinces.

In Ethiopia, NMNW worked with the International NGO FHI 360 and 21 of their local orphans and vulnerable children (OVC) support partners to train 30 female Instructors who were able to graduate 1,083 young people from No Means No in 4 regions across the country in 2020. Similar to South Africa, NMNW plans to certify all 30 of these Instructors as lead trainers who will then train 700 Instructors from 24 local partners in 2021.

NMNW is honored to be working with such prestigious local and international partners to support the scale up of evidence-based violence prevention programming in two countries that have shown incredible demand and dedication to ending sexual violence. The rollouts of both programs are primarily being supported by USAID as part of PEPFAR's DREAMS and OVC support initiatives.



DUAL GENDER PROGRAMMING TAKES OFF IN UGANDA



NMNW launched programs in Uganda with four different partners in different regions of the country: Catholic Relief Services (CRS), Infectious Disease Institute (IDI), Mucobadi, and AVSI. The COVID-19 pandemic severely limited the rollout of No Means No in several parts of Uganda in 2020, but in rural Eastern Uganda, where AVSI and Mucobadi operate, the rates of COVID infection remained low, which meant we were able to see the effects of dual gender programming being delivered by strong local partners. With support from PEPFAR, as well as supplemental investments from the Global Innovation Fund and the Oak

Foundation, 123 Instructors from CRS, IDI, AVSI and Mucobadi were able to graduate 6,206 girls and 7,139 boys from No Means No in 2020.
Furthermore, aftercare support was made available to youth participants. Instructors, participants, and community members shared many stories of the transformational impact No Means No has had on their lives.

As one 18-year-old male participant told us, "Thanks to [the] No Means No program, I now have the knowledge of humility, life skills, and values to tackle matters of violence in my community."



RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

Research published in 2020 on No Means No programming focused on programming with youth on an American Indian Reservation in South Dakota, U.S. The article "Efficacy of a Sexual Abuse Prevention Program with Children on an Indian Reservation", published in the Journal of Child Sexual Abuse by researchers from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, describes a study which assessed the preliminary acceptability and efficacy of the No Means No program with 4th and 5th grade American Indian children. The study found that children's knowledge of sexual abuse and efficacy to prevent an attack increased. Additionally, the vast majority of children reported that they liked the program and that it helped keep them safe.




Do you believe you are worth defending? Yes I am worth defending. Do you think you can shout your loudest? Yes I can shout my loudest. Now, with all that they become eager.
